

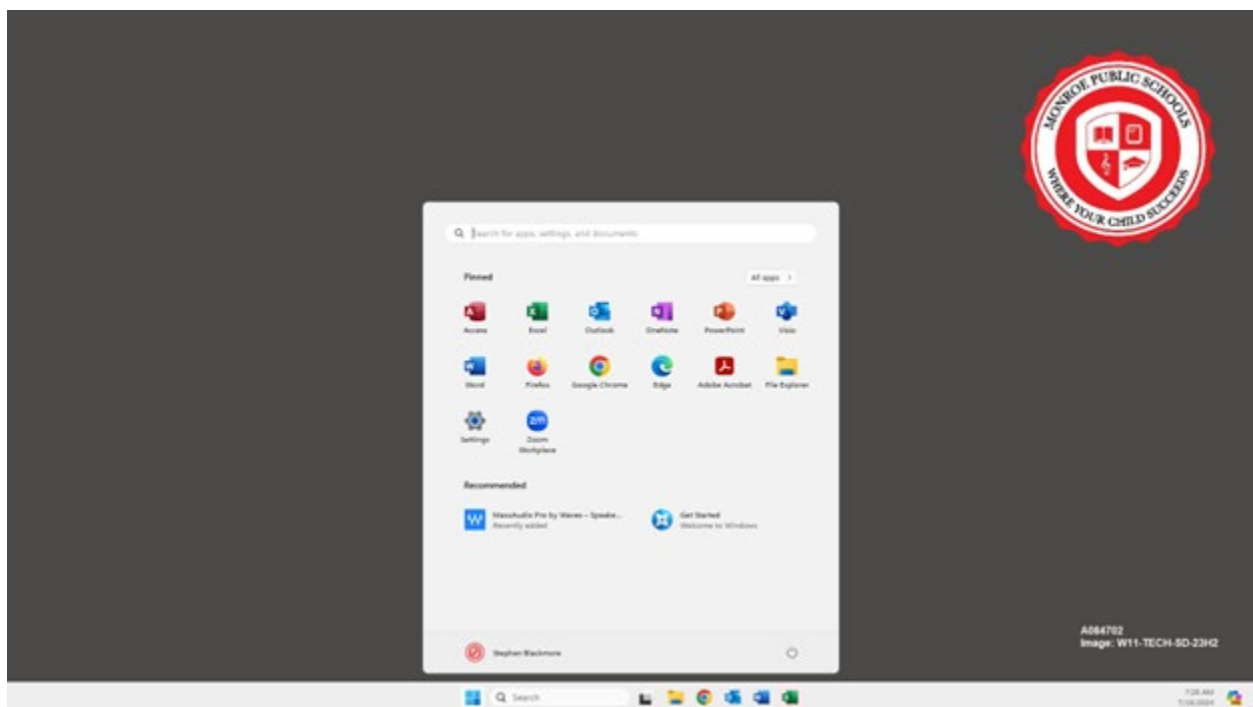
Let's explore the key differences between Windows 10 and 11

Start Menu:

Windows 10: The Start Menu in Windows 10 is a familiar left-aligned panel with Live Tiles (those colorful squares showing app updates).

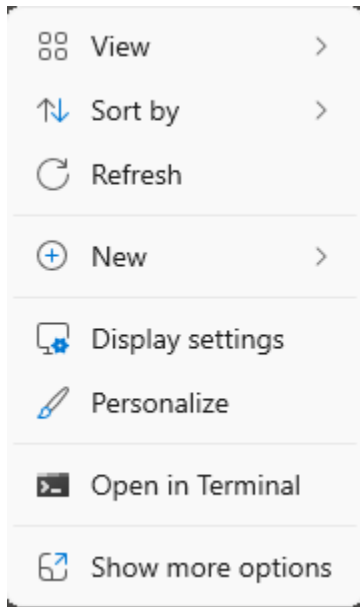
Windows 11: In Windows 11, the Start Menu is centered and simpler. It displays a static list of apps, followed by your most frequently used documents at the bottom. No more Live Tiles here!



Taskbar:

Windows 10: The taskbar in Windows 10 is at the bottom, and you can customize it quite a bit. You can resize it, move it around, and even shrink the icons.

Windows 11: Windows 11's taskbar is centered (a bit like macOS).



Right-Click Actions:

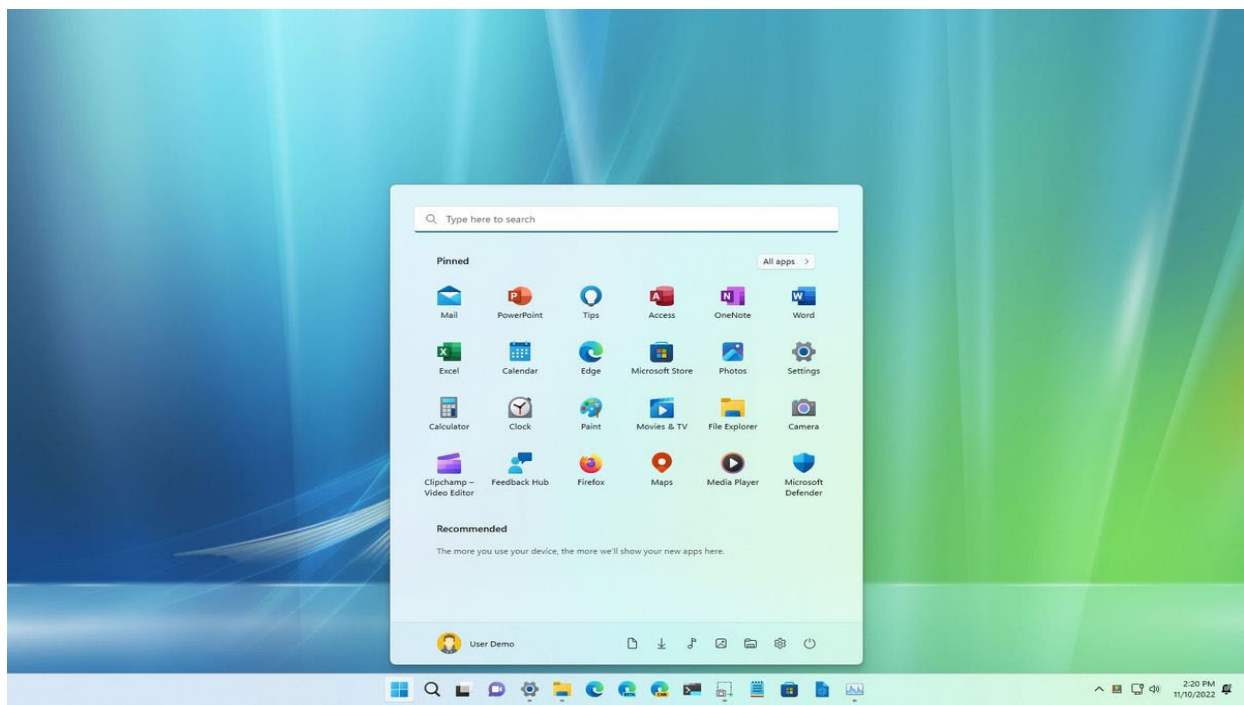
Windows 10: A smaller, limited menu of options is available by right-clicking your mouse.

Windows 11: A more prominent, easier-to-read menu of familiar items is now available via right-click. To see the old style, click “show more options,” which will display the right-click from Windows 10.

Pinned Apps:

Windows 10: You can pin apps to the taskbar or Start Menu.

Windows 11: It's the same deal, but in Windows 11, you'll find a Pinned apps section right in the Start Menu.



Recommended Section:

Windows 10: Nope, doesn't exist.

Windows 11: The Recommended section in the Start Menu suggests your most-used apps and files. Handy for quick access!
